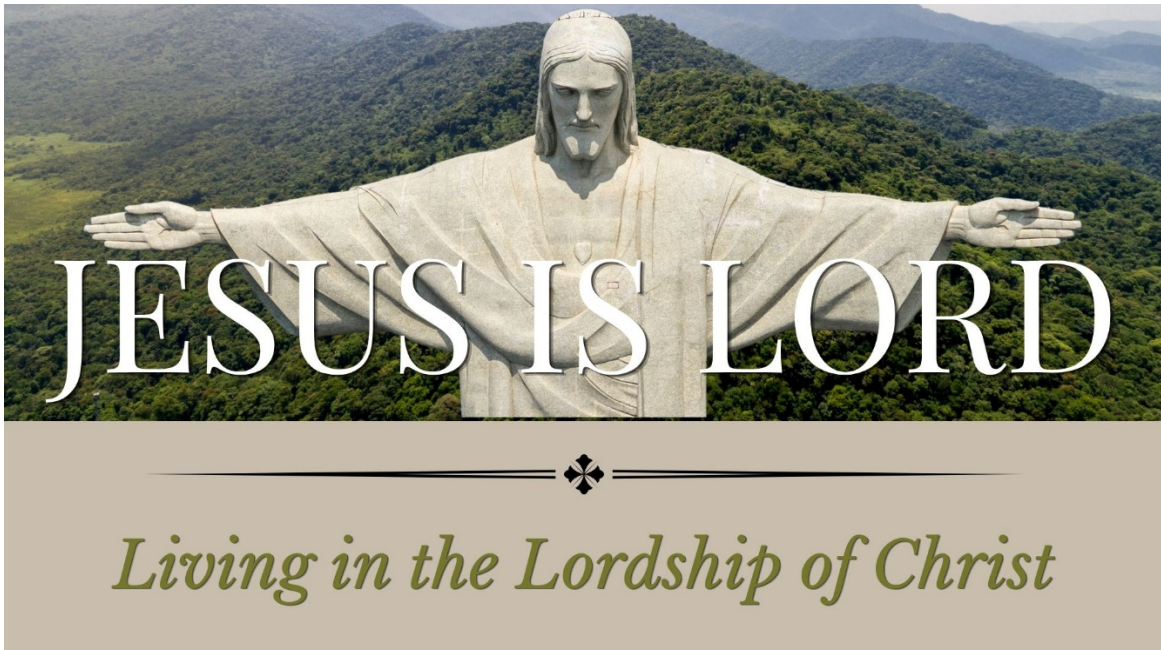

THIS WEEK'S "AT HOME" DEVOTIONAL

Justice: Luke 4:16–21

GATHERING

Light a candle to remind yourselves that Jesus brings good news, freedom, healing, and hope—and calls us to join his work of justice.

PRAYER OF THE WEEK

God of justice and mercy, open our eyes to suffering and our hearts to your vision for the world. Free us from indifference, prejudice, and the desire to protect only ourselves. Teach us to listen humbly, speak truthfully, and act courageously. Through the Holy Spirit, make us partners in the liberating work of Jesus Christ. Amen.

CARING CONVERSATION - Take a few moments to check in with one another.
Highs & Lows

- What is one thing that brought you joy this week?
- Where have you seen someone treated fairly—or unfairly—this week?

THINKING ABOUT THE UPCOMING WEEK’S SCRIPTURE

In his hometown synagogue, Jesus reads Isaiah’s promise of good news, freedom, sight, and liberation, then declares that this Scripture is being fulfilled. Justice is not separate from Jesus’ mission. It is God’s healing work that confronts what harms people and seeks their flourishing.

- What does this passage reveal about the mission of Jesus?
- Where do you see people burdened, excluded, or denied what they need to flourish?
- Why must the work of justice include listening and learning?
- What is one faithful action you can take without making another person your enemy?

DAILY BIBLE READINGS - As you read this week, ask: **How does God call us to seek justice, practice mercy, and repair what is broken?**

DEVOTIONAL

The world is filled with injustice: hunger beside abundance, unequal treatment, violence, and systems that place heavy burdens on some people. Yet Scripture is clear that God sees those who suffer and calls God’s people to seek justice.

Justice is more than individual kindness. Compassion responds to immediate pain; justice also asks why the harm keeps happening and what must change. It seeks healing, fairness, accountability, and the flourishing of every neighbor.

Jesus places this work at the heart of his mission. In Luke 4, he announces good news for the poor, freedom for prisoners, sight for the blind, and liberation for the oppressed. His ministry then makes those words visible as he heals, welcomes outsiders, confronts religious hypocrisy, and restores people to community.

The work of justice begins with listening and learning. We approach those most affected with humility, resist reducing people to labels, and examine how our choices may contribute to harm. We seek understanding and join others whose experience can guide wiser action.

Justice also requires perseverance. Problems shaped over many years rarely change quickly. We may become tired, discouraged, or tempted to treat opponents as enemies. Christ calls us to remain grounded in love—to tell the truth without contempt, pursue accountability without revenge, and work for the good of the whole community.

We cannot repair everything, but we can offer ourselves to God’s work. We can share resources, speak for those ignored, support fair practices, and join ministries addressing immediate needs and their causes. When Jesus is Lord, justice becomes a way we embody his kingdom on earth as it is in heaven.

PRAY TOGETHER

Invite each person to name an injustice that concerns them and one person or community from whom they need to learn. Then pray together:

God of justice, thank you for hearing the cries of your people. Forgive us when comfort, fear, or prejudice keeps us from responding. Teach us to listen before we speak, to seek truth without contempt, and to act with courage and humility. Show us how to repair harm, protect the vulnerable, and reflect the liberating love of Jesus. Amen.

MEALTIME PRAYER

God of abundance, thank you for this food and for everyone gathered here. Make us grateful, generous, and committed to a world in which every neighbor has what they need to flourish. Amen.

SERVICE CHALLENGE - *This is one way we share God’s love with the world.*

Choose one justice concern in your community. Listen to someone directly affected, learn from a trustworthy local organization, and take one concrete step through service, advocacy, generosity, or personal change.

CLOSING & BLESSING

Extinguish your candle as a reminder that Christ sends you to carry good news, freedom, healing, and hope into the world.

With permission, make the sign of the cross on one another’s hands or foreheads and say: ***‘Go in the justice and mercy of Christ. Seek what is right, repair what is broken, and let God’s kingdom become visible through you.’***
